SPEAKER'S BUSINESS

Speaker: Welcome, happy new year, hope semester is going well. My name is Megan and I am the assembly speaker for ASUS. Looking forward to working with you. Not a lot of business to get to, lengthier discussion period.

DISCUSSION PERIOD



Speaker:

Before the discussion period begins, I want to go over some etiquette for the discussion period:

- Dean provost is here to respond to questions: 7:15 to 7:45. I would also like to welcome Donna, Vice Principal of Finance and Admin.
- This is a tough topic to be discussed and the goal for this period is to be informative, productive and respectful conversation.
- If you have a question for the provost, go to the far right side of the room (empty table) to start a queue for who would like to ask questions
- Be respectful and conscious of time
- I will tell all attendees wen the discussion is wrapping up

Amaiya: Well start with an online question first: What plans are there for more income in other departments that don't rely on student enrollment or tuition?

Provost: Quite tough considering we are a university and our main business is education

- Upping our game on international student (involves teaching students)
- Raise revenue without teaching students \rightarrow Donations from many donors, but most donations are given for a specific person
 - 1. Such as the large donation to engineering to transform the education
 - 2. We get them for buildings, for scholarships, never really to underpin the operational costs
 - a. These are relied on by tuition by students

Akash Singh: How do you plan to bring international students if our rankings are falling due to cuts?

Provost: Drop in enrolment is one of the reasons why we are in this financial position (because they have higher tuition) Why do they come to Queen's? To do their degrees that will set them up for careers for the rest of their lives. Some pay attention to rankings, which are very important in many places (like in China). So, we need to address rankings, Whether it's the only thing that's important I'm not sure, we need many reasons to attract international students

Zhao: Will the tuition for international students increase drastically given the budget deficit?

Provost: Definitely looking at the fee, but i would suggest at the moment in arts and science is gonna be high already. I would be surprised if the fee would go up for arts



and science, I thought the conversation would be more about going up. Hoping it will be compensated for by having a larger number of people coming.

Amber: Some of us are afraid of our degrees being seen as whether they make profit or not. How do you plan to support these degrees, showing that their degrees matter just as much as degrees that have more funding?

Provost: Not really a question of whether departments are profitable or not. We need to make changes across the whole university. How do we get to the point that we can save money we need to save while preserving the student experience and research related to the university? (tightrope we have to walk). No one wants to remove programs, but we have to think about how much we have to spend on them because somehow we have to save money. There are lots of ways to do this, like being efficient in the support activities towards different departments. In the end, we will have to find ways of cross subsidizing activities in this faculty with other faculties. Most of our money comes from tuition, so we fund all of the rest of it by taking money that is coming in through teaching activity in other faculties. So we will have to work out a way (next year probably) to bring in money that would have been elsewhere (health sciences, eng) to these departments, alongside how do we cut costs and increase revenue.

Online question: Will I be able to complete my program in full? What will my degree/classes look like at queen's?

Provost: No doubt about it, students come in and we have a commitment to them, for their entire time at queen's. Second part is an individual by individual answer, impossible for me to answer with any degree of actual accuracy.

Follow up: What kinds of changes will we see in class size, TAs, etc?

Provost: Decisions are for the faculty, not me. My job is to run the budget, a very decentralized system at queens. Each faculty has agency over the money they bring in and the money they spend. Most is, at the end of the day, on salaries. TA's, profs, admin teams, all these salaries add up to about two thirds of the total amount of money spent on the university. All those decisions are made by the faculty leaders, not the provost. I do not impose a certain solution on any faculties, you would have to address that question to a dean or an associate dean.

Audience question



Provost: Closure of admission for Dean - Dean will deal with faculty level issues at a subsequent meeting, question needs to be reserved for another meeting

Follow up question: All decisions are being made at a faculty level, mandate to cut courses below 10 students, did they come from faculty or you?

Provost: This faculty has had a rule limiting min enrolment of students at 10 for about 15 years. That rule was instituted by this faculty. Last July, my predecessor reminded all deans they should be restricting enrollment. All other faculties have already done so, ARTSCI is returning their stance on this decision to the previous stance for the next academic year.

Follow up question: Mechanism for the dean to grant exemptions, does that mean that the fact that "all students will then be able to finish their degree" will take precedence over the exemption?

Provost: Exemption is granted by the dean. You answered your own question. The courses that a student signs up for will be there.

Mifkovic: Students feel like they have been kept out of the loop, this question is about transparency. Do you have any plans to increase transparency so that students know what is happening (council meetings that we are not allowed in)? We are worried about the quality of our education.

Provost: Things behind closed doors. Always possible for anyone to communicate more. There are no secret meetings happening behind closed doors. Board of trustees has a director and students sitting. Student representative is a student. The chair of AMS reports to every board meeting. They are in regular contact with the board. Same can be said of the governing of the university. These meetings have student representatives, there are no other government meetings that students might be on. We can try to be more communicative, I acknowledge that, the budget situation was put out in an article. These are the things that get out.

Follow-up question from Mifkovic: Even then, there are a small number of students being kept in the loop. Are there any things to make more students come (published, recorded?) to hear word of mouth

Provost: We have 28k students in university. That's why we have representatives. Director is the student rep. You need some way of producing representatives when you are bringing representatives, it's not simply possible to talk to every student. I am open



to talk to student representatives, that's why I am here. I have been trying to talk to AMS leadership since I've been here.

Follow-up question from Mifkovic: Recordings? Reproduction of meetings

Provost: We have problems with recordings. They will end up on youtube and be put around the world, do we want that to happen? I would rather have a frank conversation with student reps and hope they pass it on to students.

Robertson: One of the reasons we are in this budget issue is because of tuition raises from in province students. How are we increasing out of province students to compensate for this change?

Provost: Student affairs has regular outreach to diff parts of Canada to attract out of province students. Happens weekly. Increased interest in students coming from out of province. Quebec province changed their own tuition for anglophone students, and should increase students coming from quebec. We have drawn students from BC and AB, those numbers have gone up again. We would all have to recognize that it will come at the expense of Ontario students. You take more from Alberta, you take less from Ontario. Put them at disadvantage.

Akash Singh: Computing enrollment has doubled, we bring in significant revenue, what cuts can we make?

Provost: School of computing is in the faculty, and provides part of the overall revenue stream for the faculty. Specific recommendations for a school like that, keep doing the things that you're doing very well. Computing is one of our best subjects, something we're very proud of, we want them to carry out what they're doing.

Follow up Akash Singh: Some convos with the director of computing from a student perspective show there's a slight gap in our feelings about how school of computing is. We need better ratios for students to profs, and our budget has not increased, student numbers have increased, lots of pressure.

Provost: I manage the budget to the faculty, the faculty decides how those numbers are. You manage the "doubling" of money. I would be surprised in reality if that is actually what happens (missed the first part here).

Stemp: When would opportunities be to speak to the Deans?



Piper Veloso: The Dean of Arts and Science will be attending a future assembly to answer questions pertaining to FAS. We are going to be in communication with her office to sort out those details.

Audience question: At town hall it was mentioned that you didn't reject any applications for the hiring freeze for profs.

Provost: True

Audience question: Does your office look for specific things in an application that would support you to approve or deny it? What I mean is is there anything you have told the faculties you are looking for in an application or is it up to the faculties to decide whether to forward an application

Provost: It's up to the faculties if they want me to provide an exemption for a position, I need to do that. But, no one has come to me with a case.

Emma Capstick: How are you working to support the faculty of Arts and Science, I know it is your job to do budgets not allocation, how do you work together?

Provost: I am meeting with the Dean tomorrow, I meet with all sorts of different groups to make it all work out. One of these things I said when I arrived, Queen's is a university, it is more than just a simple collection of faculties, we need to work together to fix this problem. One example of a problem is the issue of international student enrolment. The dean of student affairs reports to me, we have been working to understand what we have been doing wrong and right with international student recruitment, ensuring we have programs for international students to convince them to come take them. Marketing is by student affairs, but the programs themselves originate in faculties. We need high quality programs that international students will want to do, which means faculties may have to look at to see whether they are a good fit for international students. Student affairs takes that and tries to "sell" that. Example of collaborative effort.

Audience: We've heard about faculty cuts, but i am wondering what other cuts we have made and where else we have looked for money?

Provost: We've looked wherever we can find. It's not just this faculty, it's also shared services, whereas faculties have been given until 2025-2026 to look at their books. Shared services were given until 2024-2025 to look at their budget and have had to bring in savings. Money has to come wherever the university can find it.



Audience: Cutting Upper level administrative costs?

Provost: All levels have been exposed to the requirement to save costs

Mifkovic: What is the administration doing for these cuts, I know for Artsci they may even cut their office supplies. What are individual admins doing?

Provost: Every single office has had cuts. We have all had to come in line with these cuts, we have all contributed to the deficit mitigation fund, looking to cross subsidize this faculty. The biggest difference you may see: each faculty is its own unit. The scale of the cuts in each faculty depends on the nature of the faculty and the deficit.

Mifkovic: Deficit mitigation fund, how are you contributing to that?

Provost: Every single office has been contributing to it.

Megan: 5 more min left in the discussion!

Yang: You have been portrayed as the villain in this conflict. Do you have a plan to rebrand your image in this deficit, for global news and CBC (other news), do you plan to put some effort into rebranding for incoming students?

Provost: I leave my enormous snake at home, that's how I rebrand. Do I need to do a rebrand? I don't know. My job here is to try and make this university as good as possible, to get it through this difficult period of time, and I arrived in august and inherited this situation that had been created previously. My job is to look at the situation and work on it. Universities are old organizations. Queen's is about 170 years old, and that's quite a long time but it's a short time in comparison. Universities have survived difficult times, so has Queen's. Two world wars. This university is still here. We will survive this, go forward from this, learn from mistakes, pull together, and my job is to help it through that process, not to worry about my own personal image. I know people are saying bad things behind my back, but does it really matter?

Donna Janiec: We need to reinforce resilience. It is never easy to get through budget cuts, we have to make choices no one wants to. Queen's has done it before, we come out stronger in the end, and I know that will happen. Arts and Sci will not be left on its own. Arts and science is lucky to have had increased budgets with increased international students before covid, Arts and Science was supported by other faculties in the past, at present some of these difficult decisions must be made so we can be



stronger at the end as we look at increasing revenue and looking at donations. In terms of being open and transparent (addressing Amber), this is a great example. Please send us questions, because nothing is secret. It's that positive message that we will come out of it, even if there are tough times.

Sean: Has there been outreach to Arts and science alumni outlining the scenario, we care about future students, (we're not all Smiths), if it was done the right way and many little contributions could perhaps solve the problem. No solutions are being talked about, only the problem. Has that outreach happened? Perhaps it could

Provost: We are proud of our alumni and grateful for their support. I don't know if there's been an outreach to the Arts and Science alumni base, we constantly communicate with donors though. I think we are, centrally, but I can't answer the question fully.

Society Finances

Since our last term, I've worked closely with our General Manager, Sean, over the holidays to finalize several accounting and budget matters before the new year. We have successfully paid out all the honorarium and food credits to ASUS volunteers, as well as our fall distributions for ASUS grants and ASURF with great help from our accounting team. We are now making strategic plans for our next honoraria and grant distributions that will be processed at the end of this winter term. Additionally, we have categorized all transactions within our accounting system and have updated the General Operating Budget (GOB) accordingly. I will continue to hold monthly budget meetings with the ASUS council to accurately keep track of society spendings.

Direct Reports

Before the break, I discussed the ideas of several projects with my direct reports for the new year. The ASUS Store Manager and I are currently working to address our large inventory of textbook donations to ASUS, and have made a variety of events plans throughout this term to offer such resources to students on campus.

Moreover, after meeting with the ASUS IT Director, we are working to bring new additions to the technology lending library.
