PRESIDENT REPORT

Dear ASUS Assembly,

I hope week 12 finds you well and remembering to take care of yourselves! As we close off the fall 2022 semester, I am inspired and in awe by everything ASUS has accomplished and the community we have fostered for ArtSci students and the broader Queen's community! My largest focus for the past couple of weeks has been supporting my direct reports in finalizing their projects before the winter break and gearing down for my personal projects next semester. As I reminisce on these past few months together, I would like to recognize the tireless and admirable commitment, work, and advocacy, of ASUS council, all ASUS volunteers, and to you, members of ASUS assembly, for building a welcoming community for ArtSci students! It is with great honour that I present my final report for the semester and provide some updates from the President's office.

Orientation

I would like to congratulate and welcome the incoming Chair team for Orientation 2023, Academics Chair Charlotte Falck, C.A.R.E Chair Alli de Jong, Operations Chair Sophia Filosa, and Sociocultural Chair Amy Richardson! The orientation team will be closing off the semester with the hiring of the Orientation Coordinators and commencing the transition period with the outgoing team. The executive team and Head Gael Georgia had the pleasure of attending the Orientation summit earlier this month where we participated in constructive conversation & feedback about orientation 2022 and the future of orientation. Some of the discussed topics included transparency, policy re-writes, university decision making, and faculty society supports. I look forward to updating you all on the long-term projection and future strategy of ASUS orientation.

Advocacy

As some of you may know, the Bachelor of Fine Arts program may potentially be undergoing a pause of admissions by the FAS' Dean's Office. Over the semester,

Academics Commissioner Alicia Parker and I have been actively engaging in conversations and have attended several consultation sessions with the Associate Deans, students, and faculty members from Fine Arts. We recognize the concerns and distress that this decision has presented to many current students and faculty members in the program, as such we will continue to advocate for student voices to be at the center of this discussion and will continue to keep the student body updated. The theme for the Thought Exchange this year is focused on assessing 2nd-4th year student academic experiences and will be released at the start of the fall semester. I appreciate the ongoing support from Dr. Wendy Craig on this Thought Exchange and look forward to its release.

Event Approval Process

Emma, Aloka, Sean and I have recently met with the AMS General Manager and Commissioner of Club Affairs to discuss the future of the event approval and planning process. Specifically, ensuring the process is more accessible to our event planning and timely considerate of our volunteers' efforts and capacities. Since ASUS prepares strategic plans and budgets over the summer, our current objective is to share all of ASUS' large-scale events for the spring semester to expedite spring event approvals for ASUS committees and society wide events. The AMS has introduced a new form for next semester and encourage other clubs and student groups to use this form moving forward. If you have any thoughts, questions, or concerns about the approval process please reach out and let me know, as we continue advocating for a more accessible system.

<u>Direct Reports</u>

DSAR

The Director of Student Affairs Research has officially launched the survey on Financial Accessibility and Food Security, we are astonished by the level of engagement the survey has received and look forward to supporting Director Charlotte in the data consolidation and report presentation next semester.

Professional Development

The Alumni Mentorship Initiative is still accepting student mentees for any ArtSci student interested in pairing with an alumni mentor from their discipline/field of interest. I invite you to sign-up and encourage your friends to do so as well! We have started planning for the winter 2023 Life After ArtSci, a spring networking social, and our workshop series – more on this next month!

SVPR

The SVPR Director has recently presented a report on the updates of the Interfaculty Coalition to the University SVPR Taskforce. As we work to strengthen

the relationship between student and faculty advocacy, our largest objective is to ensure any new bills. Once the policy review process is in the approval stages, the Interfaculty Coalition will be focusing on SVPR and consensual practices in the classroom and in curricula.

Intern Council

The ASUS interns are doing incredible work, both as an intern council as well as with their commissioners/officers! Some of the projects they have been collaboratively working on are a Safety Night Light initiative and an academic and experience survey for the class of 2026. I'm eager to continue learning from and working with this inspiring group of students and supporting them in their project planning!

To end things off with our final reports for the calendar year, I would like to thank you very much for your active engagement and commitment to assembly for the past few months. I have sincerely appreciated listening, learning, and sharing space with you all. Looking forward to what spring 2023 has in store! As this is our last Assembly of the year before our return in January, I would like to give enormous congratulations to Caitlin Sankaran-Wee, the ASUS Governance Officer, for bringing these meetings back in-person for the first time since 2020. Caitlin has done the most incredible work within the Governance Office this past semester. The smooth running of Assemblies, Reports, and Agendas would not have been possible without her efforts, and we could not be more grateful!

As it has not been too long since our last Assembly, you will find below a shorter list of updates since we last met.

Academic Advocacy | As a follow-up to last month's Assembly when acting Associate Dean of Teaching and Learning, Dr. James Fraser, attended as a guest speaker, I want to remind you that ASUS is a resource for any academic related concerns. Yara, Alicia, and I have the privilege of meeting with Dr. Fraser bi-weekly, as well as meet with other members of faculty and administration, all of whom are always looking to hear student feedback and concerns.

Elections | On November 24th, Yara, Aloka, Brandon Aldworth, and I had the wonderful opportunity to speak at and take part in the "So You Wanna Run in an Election?" mixer. Thank you to Caitlin, the Governance Officer, and her team for hosting such an incredible event. If you or anyone you know is interested in running for an elected position, ASUS Executive or otherwise, please do not hesitate to reach out and consult with any of us. We are more than happy to answer any questions that we can and are beyond thrilled to see engagement in the electoral and larger governance process!

ASUS Camps | We are very excited to welcome a new ASUS Camps team in early January. I have been in contact with Agathe Nicholson and Johanne Bénard from Queen's French Department, both of whom have agreed to help interview candidates and assess their French language proficiency. As this is the second-year ASUS runs a French component to camp, we are very excited to get

their input and see how we can improve programming for future summers of camp!

ASUS City Engagement Program | By the time of Assembly, Elisabeth McHarg and I will have hosted our first group meeting with all ACEP volunteers. We have put them in contact with their respective members of the City of Kingston and ASUS Council members. Elisabeth and I are already planning to support volunteers in their projects next semester and finding ways to integrate feedback mechanisms as the academic year goes on.

Sustainability | Our Sustainability Director, Katelin Boles, has been up to fantastic work in the realm of sustainability this month. Notably, she was in contact with the Queen's club Greenovations who came into the ASUS Offices and retrofitted the house to make it more sustainable. Namely, they insulated our windows, light switches, and pipes, while also changing some outdated lightbulbs and other small fixes which will undoubtedly make a big difference for years to come. This was a great opportunity to meet their team, learn more about sustainability and retrofitting, and make our operations more energy efficient, especially as we move into the colder winter months.

Additionally, Katelin and I recently met with the Co-President of Queen's Backing Action on Climate Change to discuss our event auditing process and identify areas of collaboration for the future. We were able to address common issues and propose solutions in terms of centralizing sustainability information amongst clubs on campus and leveraging the sustainability coalition as a body to disseminate information on a wider scale. We also were able to discuss areas in which ASUS can support QBACC in their advocacy initiatives – a topic which I hope to provide more updates on next semester!

Wellness | By the time of Assembly, the Wellness Team will have finished hosting two successful burnout workshops which seek to combat burnout during such a busy time of year. I am so proud of this incredible team and cannot wait to see what next semester will hold!

Excitingly, the Wellness Director, Megan Crosby, and I are also planning to booth on December 1st, handing out healthy exam study snacks while also promoting wellness to students!

ASUS' Birthday | On ASUS' 132nd Birthday, we plan to booth in the Queen's Centre, selling a new drop of merchandise designed by our Marketing and Communications Officer, Monica Szalajko. You can read more about this event in

her report, but overall, we are very excited to connect with students and celebrate the rich history of ASUS together!

Volunteer Appreciation | The latter half of November and beginning of December marks the period where ASUS tries to increase our efforts in giving back to the community. With ACS x Equity Puppies and Pastries Event, HR x MarComms Video Series, and CO x Services Food Drive, there sure is a lot of volunteer and general ArtSci student appreciation to go around!

With that, much of my time in the last few weeks of the month has been planning for the ASUS End-of-Year Holiday Social happening on November 29th (also ASUS' Birthday!). I'll be able to provide more updates within my verbal report at this Assembly, but from what sign-ups are looking like so far, it is sure to be a great success!

Thank you all for making the time to be here during such a busy academic period. I hope you are all taking care of yourselves as we approach finals and winter break is on the horizon. Congratulations on making it this far in the school year, only a few more weeks to go! This report will briefly provide an overview of the work going on in the Operations portfolio.

Our group and student granting committees comprised of members of Advisory Board recently took part in deliberation to assess applicants to our fall individual and committee grants. I am happy to announce that recipients of these grants are present here today to be ratified in Assembly, upon which they will receive their funding. I would like to thank all applicants for the thought and effort put into their applications, and for the impact you all have on our community. And thank you to Advisory Board members for dedicating their time to this important process!

In terms of more general updates, I have begun chatting with incoming Head Gael Georgia to start preparing for building the 2023-24 Orientation budget. Our Accounting Director of Compensation, Nate Malhis, has been hard at work administering food credits to all our all our volunteers deemed eligible as per policy. All fall food credits will be sent before the end of classes. Accounting Director of Reimbursements Ijaz Syed has been working through a high number of reimbursement requests, hoping to process all requests received to date by the end of this week. Recently hired Accounting Director of Budget Wadii Karfali

has been assisting me with closing the Orientation fundraising budget and including live updates to allsociety-wide budgets so that folks can be aware of their spending and earning standing at the start of the winter term. Store Manager Robel Kebede has been diligently working through product request forms for end-of-term sales and events! Lastly, IT Director Sylvie Garabedian has been very hard at work troubleshooting technological issues in the ASUS Office, and we will be moving forward with equipment replacement where applicable in the Winter semester.

As we approach a new year and semester, please continue to reach out if you have any questions or concerns!
